The **Conditional Operator** (?) is an operator that takes three arguments. The first argument is a comparison argument, the second is the result upon a true comparison, and the third is the result upon a false comparison. If it helps you can think of the operator as a shortened way of writing an if-else statement. It is often used to assign variables based on the result of a comparison. When used correctly it can help increase the readability and reduce the number of lines in your code.

Syntax: expression1 ? expression2 : expression3

- Expression1 can be any expression that evaluates to a Boolean value.
- If expression1 is true, then expression2 is evaluated; otherwise, expression3 is evaluated.
- The result of the ? Operation is that of the expression evaluated.
- Both expression2 and expression3 are required to return the same type, which can't be void.

1) **Bitwise NOT (~):** called bitwise complement, the unary NOT operator inverts all the bits of its operand.

Example: ~ 0111 (decimal 7) = 1000 (decimal 8)

2) **Bitwise AND (&):** the AND operator & produce a 1 bit if both operands are also 1, A zero is produced in all the cases.

```
e.g. 0101 (decimal 5)
& 0011 (decimal 3)
= 0001 (decimal 1)
```

3) **Bitwise OR (|)**: the OR operator, |, combines bits such that if either of the bits in the operand is a 1, then the resultant bit is a 1.

```
e.g. 0101 (decimal 5)
| 0011 (decimal 3)
= 0111 (decimal 7)
```

4) **Bitwise XOR (^)**: the XOR operator, ^, combines bits such that if exactly one operand is 1, then the result is 1. Otherwise, the result is zero.

```
e.g. 0101 (decimal 5)
^ 0011 (decimal 3)
= 0110 (decimal 6)
```

5) **The Left Shift (<<)**: the left shift operator, <<, shifts all of the bits in a value 'to the left' a specified number of times specified by num.

General form: value << num

```
e.g. x << 2 (x=12) 0000
      1100 << 2
= 0011 0000 (decimal 48)
```

6) **The Right Shift (>>)**: the right shift operator, >>, shifts all of the bits in a value 'to the right' a specified number of times specified by num.

General form: value >> num

```
e.g. x >> 2 (x=32) 0010  
      0000 >> 2  
      = 0000 1000 (decimal 8)
```

- Switch case statements follow a selection-control mechanism and allow a value to change control of execution.
- They are a substitute for long if statements that compare a variable to several integral values.
- The switch statement is a multiway branch statement. It provides an easy way to dispatch execution to different parts of code based on the value of the expression.

In C, the switch case statement is used for executing one condition from multiple conditions. It is like an if-else-if ladder.

The switch statement consists of conditional-based cases and a default case.

Syntax of switch

Pointers

A pointer is defined as a derived data type that can store the address of other C variables or a memory location. We can access and manipulate the data stored in that memory location using pointers.

As the pointers in C store the memory addresses, their size is independent of the type of data they are pointing to. This size of pointers in C only depends on the system architecture.

Syntax of C Pointers

The syntax of pointers is similar to the variable declaration in C, but we use the (*) dereferencing operator in the pointer declaration.

ptr is the name of the pointer.
